IMPORTANT NOTES FOR THIS SUNDAY'S RACING

- 1: Please carpool (seriously)!
- 2: Please be early (honestly)!

3: Park and double park and park people in – on the road (not in the main lot) or in the marina lot or in the hoist area or in the lower lot for the Pines.

The FCSI cardboard boat regatta (<u>https://www.fcsith.org/events/cardboard-boat-race/</u>) is happening Sunday. They will have boats arriving in and filling the main lot starting at 1PM. It will be crazy over there and they will not let you park. There will be hundreds of people around for the event. Parking will be tight. So, again, arrange carpooling, block fellow sailors you know in, show up early! Please!

And, hey, your family and friends are TOTALLY invited to go watch the cardboard boat regatta! It's \$50 for adults (\$25 for children) but you get fed (well and fully) and a couple of drink tickets! And you are supporting a great local cause whose (Family and Children's Services of Ithaca) whose resources have been severely taxed during the pandemic times!

Important notes for the day 50 miler (September 18)

Fichtre! It's the day of the Commodore's Gala at the yacht club! So... Let's see... If you're in line to be commodore or you are a past commodore, you should definitely prioritize going to the Gala and you should let *Viento* take the distance series. So, the VAVOOM virtual mark latitude series final results are (drum roll):

Congratulations *Snitch* and crew!

And we have had some Fall racing as well

Why, just this past Sunday we held races 3 and 4 of the Fall series! It wasn't hot or cold and it wasn't super windy but it was certainly damp in the end. The first race began with perhaps 15kts of wind and the second race terminated with perhaps 2kts of wind and 15kts of rain.

First course was SNWN (**S**ycamore, **N**ear Maplewood, **W**est Shore, **N**ear Maplewood). Let's see... That makes it about 5NM in length. Boats finished this one in about an hour.

Second course was WFS (**W**est Shore, **F**ar Maplewood, **S**ycamore [and you notice how the course letters match with the first letters of geographical locations on the lake? Just saying in case you haven't been following along over the years! I highlight the first letter of those locations so that it's easier to see the correspondence between the representations]) which would have been 5NM as well except that the winds dropped precipitously (presaging something) and after over an hour of sailing (and a good check on the radar) the last mark was eliminated from the course and it was now a mere 3NM in length.

Shortening the course didn't feel like it made anything happen any faster at the time although the lessening of the wind did allow each boat to check the radar on their own and to put on appropriate foul weather gear (I hope you others checked the radar and got on gear) before the deluge dropped precipitously soaking one and all in the final minutes of the race.

One little anecdote from this race... *Grey Owl* could be seen sailing to E (**E**ast Shore) after F – surely with the intention of going to S. They were hailed the good-old-fashioned way (on the telephone) and informed that the course had been changed more than half an hour prior. And despite having sailed quite a good bit further than any other boat they did quite well and earned a spot on the podium. Let this be two lessons to all:

1: carry a working VHF

2: if you're a kind and generous person others will try to emulate that (and tell you when you're clearly off course)

Oh, and, heck, one more little anecdote from the Red Jacket Regatta, too, since I forgot to put that in the newsletter... So... Jamie brings home-made cinnamon buns on the distance races (good crew to have on board!). Perhaps 45 minutes in to the regatta he called out over the VHF (he had a working one!) "Has anyone seen my cinnamon buns?" To which I replied, "Oh, sure, I saw them at the South Pavilion." Well... The Stratford/Lloyds had friends whose children had spent the night at the club (Pirate's Night!) and Jamie was able to hail them (the good-old-fashioned way) and to arrange for them to deliver the buns by motorboat (which wasn't a huge deal as *Invictus* hadn't managed to drift more than half a mile in the hour since they'd begun racing).
